DANGEROUS SNAKES OF NAMIBIA



Namibia has eighty-one species of snakes. Eleven species are considered potentially deadly. Another fourteen species can inflict a bad bite. Twenty-nine species are harmless.

HIGHLY VENOMOUS

Has caused human fatalities.

Painful bite, but does not require antivenom.

IN THE EVENT OF A SNAKE BITE

EMERGENCY PROTOCOL

1 Keep the victim calm, immobilized and transport the victim to the closest hospital without delay.

2 If the victim stops breathing, resort to artificial respiration or make use of a Bag Valve Mask.

3 Call the Poison Information Centre helpline for further advice: +27 861 555 777.

DO NOT —

- ... apply a tourniquet.
- ... cut and suck the wound.
- ... use ice or very hot water.
- ... give the victim alcohol.
- ... apply electric shock.
- ... inject antivenom randomly. Antivenom (if required) must be administered by a doctor in a hospital environment.
