COMMON SNAKES OF HEIDELBERG, GP



Heidelberg has around 25 species of snakes. Two species are considered highly venomous, and another two are venomous. One species can give a bad bite. Eight species are mildly venomous and twelve other species are harmless to humans.

HIGHLY ENOMOUS

Has caused human fatalities.

VENOMOUS

Painful bite, but does not require antivenom.

Not thought to be harmless to humans. **HARMLESS**

Not dangerous to humans.

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EMERGENCY PROTOCOL IN THE EVENT OF A SNAKE BITE

1 Keep the victim calm, immobilized and transport the victim to the closest hospital without delay.

2 If the victim stops breathing, resort to artificial respiration or make use of a Bag Valve Mask.

3 Call the Poison Information Centre helpline for further advice: 0861 555 777.

DO NOT -

- ... apply a tourniquet.
- ... cut and suck the wound.
- ... use ice or very hot water.
- ... give the victim alcohol.
- ... apply electric shock.
- ... inject antivenom randomly. Antivenom (if required) must be administered by a doctor in a hospital environment.
