# COMMON SNAKES OF BEAUFORT WEST



Beaufort West has around twenty different species of snakes. Three species are considered highly venomous. Another three may give a bad bite but are not life-threatening. Six are considered mildly venomous and the other eight are completely harmless to humans. HIGHLY VENOMOUS

Has caused human fatalities **VENOMOUS** 

Painful bite, but does not require antivenom

Not dangerous to humans



## **EMERGENCY PROTOCOL**

#### IN THE EVENT OF A SNAKE BITE

1 Keep the victim calm, immobilized and transport the victim to the closest hospital without delay.

2 If the victim stops breathing, resort to artificial respiration or make use of a Bag Valve Mask.

3 Call the Poison Information Centre helpline for further advice: 0861 555 777.

### DO NOT -

- ... apply a tourniquet.
- ... cut and suck the wound.
- ... use ice or very hot water.
- ... give the victim alcohol.
- ... apply electric shock.
- ... inject antivenom randomly. Antivenom (if required) must be administered by a doctor in a hospital environment.
