The Cape Peninsula and Table Mountain region has twenty five species of snakes. Only four species are considered very dangerous and another two are considered dangerous. The common Mole Snake, although not venomous, can inflict a nasty bite that may need stitches. Six species are mildly venomous and eleven are harmless to humans.


