COMMON SNAKES OF LEPHALAL



Lephalale has around thirty different species of snakes. Six species are considered highly venomous. Another four may give a bad bite but are not life-threatening. Nine are considered mildly venomous and the other nine are completely harmless to humans.










HIGHLY **VENOMOUS Puff Adder**

EMERGENCY PROTOCOL

IN THE EVENT OF A SNAKE BITE

1 Keep the victim calm, immobilized and transport the victim to the closest hospital without delay.

- 2 If the victim stops breathing, resort to artificial respiration or make use of a Bag Valve Mask.
- 3 Call the Poison Information Centre helpline for further advice: 0861 555 777.

DO NOT —

- ... apply a tourniquet.
- ... cut and suck the wound.
- ... use ice or very hot water.
- ... give the victim alcohol.
- ... apply electric shock.
- ... inject antivenom randomly. Antivenom (if required) must be administered by a doctor in a hospital environment.
