COMMON SNAKES OF AGGENEYS



Aggeneys has around 20 species of snakes recorded. Three species are highly venomous, another three are considered venomous. Four species are mildly venomous. Ten of the species recorded are harmless and pose no threat to humans or pets.



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EMERGENCY PROTOCOL

IN THE EVENT OF A SNAKE BITE

1 Keep the victim calm, immobilized and transport the victim to the closest hospital without delay.

2 If the victim stops breathing, resort to artificial respiration or make use of a Bag Valve Mask.

3 Call the Poison Information Centre helpline for further advice: 0861 555 777.

DO NOT —

- ... apply a tourniquet.
- ... cut and suck the wound.
- ... use ice or very hot water. ... give the victim alcohol.
- ... apply electric shock.
- ... inject antivenom randomly. Antivenom (if required) must be administered by a doctor in a hospital environment.
