COMMON AND DANGEROUS SNAKES OF NIGERIA



Nigeria has a large variety of snakes. Around 12 species of snakes are highly venomous. About nine are venomous but not deadly. The majority of snakes encountered are either mildly venomous or harmless to humans.

HIGHLY VENOMOUS

Has caused human fatalities

VENOMOUS

Painful bite, but does not require antivenom

MILDLY VENOMOUS

Not thought to be harmful

HARMLESS

Not dangerous to humans






































Olive Grass Snakes (Psammophis spp.)
