COMMON SNAKES OF WAPADRAND



Wapadrand has around 30 species of snakes recorded. Five species are considered highly venomous and another five are venomous. One species can inflict a painful bite that might need stitches. Six species are mildly venomous. The rest of the species are harmless and pose no threat to humans.



EMERGENCY PROTOCOL

IN THE EVENT OF A SNAKE BITE

1 Keep the victim calm, immobilized and transport the victim to the closest hospital without delay.

2 If the victim stops breathing, resort to artificial respiration or make use of a Bag Valve Mask.

3 Call the Poison Information Centre helpline for further advice: 0861 555 777.

DO NOT —

... apply a tourniquet.

- ... cut and suck the wound.
- ... use ice or very hot water.
- ... give the victim alcohol.
- ... apply electric shock.
- ... inject antivenom randomly. Antivenom (if required) must be administered by a doctor in a hospital environment.
