COMMON SNAKES OF TZANEEN



There are around 31 snake species recorded for the greater Tzaneen region. The majority of snake species in this area are harmless or mildly venomous. Six species are considered highly venomous and another two are venomous.

– DO NOT —

- ... apply a tourniquet.
- ... cut and suck the wound.
- ... use ice or very hot water.
- ... give the victim alcohol.
- ... apply electric shock.
- ... inject antivenom randomly. Antivenom (if required) must be administered by a doctor in a hospital environment.
