# COMMON SNAKES OF GA-MPHAHLELE



Ga-Mphahlele has around 33 species of snakes. Six species are highly venomous and another four are venomous. Ten species are mildly venomous and another two can inflict a nasty bite. The other eleven species are harmless.

HIGHLY VENOMOUS

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# **EMERGENCY PROTOCOL**

### IN THE EVENT OF A SNAKE BITE

1 Keep the victim calm, immobilized and transport the victim to the closest hospital without delay.

2 If the victim stops breathing, resort to artificial respiration or make use of a Bag Valve Mask.

## **DO NOT**

... apply a tourniquet.

- ... cut and suck the wound.
- ... use ice or very hot water.
- ... give the victim alcohol.
- ... apply electric shock.
- ... inject antivenom randomly.
  Antivenom (if required) must
  be administered by a doctor
  in a hospital environment.
