# COMMON SNAKES OF ST LUCIA



St Lucia has around twenty eight species of snakes. Five species are highly venomous and another one can give a bad bite that might require some stitches. Eight species are mildly venomous. The rest of the species are harmless to humans.

Not dangerous to humans









### IN THE EVENT OF A SNAKE BITE

- 1 Keep the victim calm, immobilized and transport the victim to the closest hospital without delay.
- 2 If the victim stops breathing, resort to artificial respiration or make use of a Bag Valve Mask.

## DO NOT -

- ... apply a tourniquet.
- ... cut and suck the wound.
- ... use ice or very hot water.
- ... give the victim alcohol.
- ... apply electric shock.
- ... inject antivenom randomly. Antivenom (if required) must be administered by a doctor in a hospital environment.
